1 Overview of the course

This course offers the students an introduction to Basque, a non-Indo-European isolated language spoken in Northern Spain and (to a lesser extent) Southern France. The first weeks will be devoted to an exposition of its major phonological, morphological, and syntactic features. After that, we will conduct an in-depth exploration of two aspects of the language that have featured prominently in the literature: (1) the connection between word order, intonation, and information structure; and (2) the verbal agreement system.
